ECONOMIC 550CIAL IMPACT

- 100% CAGR in court construction investment (UAE & KSA, 2021–2025)
- Padel courts integrated into malls, residential compounds, mixed-use developments
- Tournament participation in KSA up > 15% annually over the past 3 years

STRATEGIC INSIGHTS

- MENA's padel infrastructure growth rate (2021–2025) outpaces most other emerging sports
- UAE & KSA lead in capital investment
- Egypt's growth driven by high-visibility urban projects

Future growth depends on:

- Increasing women's participation (currently <6% in KSA)
- Hosting international-standard events to secure global ranking points

Padel's rise in MENA is more than a passing trend.

It reflects changing lifestyles, a growing demand for new leisure activities, and strong investment in sports as part of urban development.

With infrastructure expanding quickly, the next phase will focus on inclusivity, raising competitive standards, and positioning MENA as a global hub.

The question is no longer if padel will secure its place in the region's sports culture, but how far it can go on the world stage.
